Resolution 8

In Support of American Bar Association Resolution 105C

- WHEREAS, the Conference of Chief Justices recognizes that a fair and impartial judiciary is indispensable to preserving justice and the rule of law; and
- WHEREAS, the Conference is committed to preserving due process as one of the most basic values of our justice system; and
- WHEREAS, fair and impartial justice requires that judges act without regard to the identity of parties or their attorneys, the judge's own interests or potential criticism; and
- WHEREAS, the Conference, at its January 29, 2014 Midyear Meeting adopted Resolution 8 urging its members to establish procedures that incorporate transparent, timely, and independent review for determining a party's motion for judicial disqualification/recusal; and
- WHEREAS, the American Bar Association is considering Resolution 105C at its 2014 Annual Meeting; and
- WHEREAS, Resolution 105C urges states and territories to adopt judicial disqualification and recusal procedures that: (1) take into account the fact that certain campaign expenditures and contributions, including independent expenditures, made during judicial elections raise concerns about possible effects on judicial impartiality and independence; (2) are transparent; (3) provide for the timely resolution of disqualification and recusal motions; and (4) include a mechanism for the timely review of denials to disqualify or recuse that is independent of the subject judge; and (5) provide guidance and training to judges in deciding disqualification/recusal motions; and
- WHEREAS, ABA Resolution 105C is consistent with the provisions of CCJ Resolution 8;
- NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Conference of Chief Justices urges the American Bar Association to adopt Resolution 105C.
